

CHURCH HILL, COLESHILL STREET AND MILL STREET THE 'OLD SUN' PUBLIC HOUSE

The 'Old Sun' Public House was situated in Coleshill Street, almost directly opposite the Holbeche residence. It was also just two or three doors down from the 'Royal Oak', which stood on the corner of Coleshill Street and Mill Street.




View of the 'Old Sun' Inn from the High Street Circa 1890. Note the pub sign and the large glass globe which, no doubt, depicts the Sun.

The building has a very long history and dates back to at least the reign of Charles I (1625-1649). The first recorded account of the original property is a Conveyance dated 30th December 1646, when it was probably a farmhouse. One might recall that this was about the time the English Civil War was drawing to a close (1642-1646). The document in question was a Feoffment (a deed conferring the right to the next person to sell or to leave to heirs, or as a gift). The parties involved were John Hill the elder in the first part and William Penn, William Willy and John Penn in the second part.

Between 1703 and 1751 the property belonged to the Cockersall family. Thomas Cockersall then sold it to Abraham Outon, who developed the property by replacing two outhouses with dwelling houses on the Coleshill Street frontage. Outon changed the use of the building and Richard Smith appeared to have been installed as the Innkeeper. The property was subsequently inherited by his grandson Thomas Alldridge in 1809 when, at this time, it was known as the 'Sun' Public House.

Charles Alldridge in 1819 then inherited from his brother Thomas and the Directory for Sutton Coldfield shows Alice Alldridge as the landlady in 1835. According to Sarah Holbeche in her diary, in 1836 Alice Alldridge married a Mr Charles Smith of Charles Smith's Coaches and they went to live at Miss Pimlott's house opposite. In February 1848 he was one of the pall bearers at the funeral of Sarah's father, Thomas Holbeche, along with Richard Browne, Whitworth Hay, John Alldridge and Mr Field. Although married, she continued to use the name Alldridge until she was succeeded by John Alldridge in 1841.

John Alldridge was the son of Alice Alldridge and his name first appeared in the 1841 Census Return. He continued to serve the customers of the beerhouse until 1855. The Alldridge family therefore had control of the 'Old Sun' for a period of approximately 46 years.

On Monday the 5th November 1855 an article appeared in Aris's Birmingham Gazette which stated:-

Notice: The 'Old Sun' Inn, Sutton Coldfield to be sold by auction by Samuel Kempson on Friday 16th November 1855 at the house of Mr John Alldridge in the town of Sutton Coldfield at 3.00pm in the afternoon (by direction of the Trustees of Sale) subject to conditions to be then produced – the following valuable PROPERTIES:-

LOT 1. All that the above-named, well-accustomed FREEHOLD PUBLIC HOUSE called the 'Old Sun', with a capital club-room, sitting room, parlour, convenient bedrooms, Brewhouse, Stable and other Out-offices, with garden behind the same, situated in Coleshill Street in the town of Sutton Coldfield now and for many years past in the occupation of Mr John Aldridge, the Proprietor.

Immediate possession can, if required, be given and the Household Goods, Furniture, Fixtures, Brewing utensils and other Effects, may be taken at a fair valuation.

- LOT 2. Nine undivided TENTH PARTS or SHARES of and in a most comfortable FREEHOLD DWELLING HOUSE, with small garden, Brewhouse and Outbuildings behind the same, situated on the CHURCH HILL in the town of Sutton Coldfield aforesaid, now in the occupation of Mr Thomas Halbeard at the annual rent of 13s.
- LOT 3 One undivided THIRD PART or SHARE of and in all those LEASEHOLD MESSUAGES and SHOPS, centrally situated in the High Street of Sutton Coldfield, recently occupied by Mrs Sarah Smith, Draper and Mr William Henry Hamlyn, Baker, together with the Outbuildings, Stabling, Yards and Gardens behind the same, which premises are now occupied by Mr John Flecknoe, at the annual rent of 26s.
- LOT 4. A convenient nine-quarter MALTHOUSE adjoining LOT 1. in the occupation of the said John Aldridge, together with the Dwelling House attached, fronting the street and in the occupation of Mr Robert Wilson.

For further particulars apply at the offices of Messrs Holbeche and Addenbrooke in Sutton Coldfield, or to the Auctioneer in Sutton Coldfield or at his office 36 Union Street, Birmingham.

William Goodwin, who also owned the 'Beggars Bush' at New Oscott, was the purchaser of the property and he installed Mr William Betts as the Licensee.

In his Diary, Richard Holbeche, stated:-

"Who kept the 'Old Sun' before William Betts I do not know. I do know that Betts must have been a very popular host for, in pre-railway days his house was a great meeting place for Birmingham tradesmen who, on Sundays, drove their wives in gay bonnets to take the Sutton air. They came in smart dog carts drawn by fast trotting ponies of a type not now met with".

He also went on to say:-

"Old Betts, William Betts' father, occupied the ugly red house opposite the church yard. He was a pleasant, old-fashioned man who wore breeches and gaiters and sometimes a long smock. His wife was tall, grey and had an upright figure and a very prepossessing face".

Sarah Holbeche, in her diary, also had something to say about the Betts family because in 1865 she wrote:-

"Mrs Betts, formerly of the 'Old Sun' Inn and of later years the Emmanuel College Arms in Mill Street, died.

Her last entry, created something of a mystery, as she stated that in April 1869:-

"William Betts died at the 'Old Sun' Inn – a life wasted, abused and mis-used".

Whatever could she have meant by this? Was it the case that, being the landlord of a public house, offered him too easy an access to alcohol from which he eventually succumbed. Sadly, one will never know the full story!

Richard Holbeche mentioned earlier about the use of dog carts. These vehicles were derived directly from gigs and were either two or four wheeled vehicles. As their name suggests they were originally used for the transporting of sporting dogs, which were carried under the seat.

In 1869, upon the death of William Betts, Henry Foden took control but, 3 years later, on the 10th July 1872, he also sadly died. The Death Certificate stated that he died from a 'disease of the heart'. This was certified after an inquest was held into the cause of his death. His wife, Mrs Maria Foden, replaced him and the following year was quite a momentous one for her as, during this period, she was declared bankrupt and she met and married a Mr Charles Kemp. However, less than a year later, on the 23rd September 1874, she too died.

In 1875 Richard Holbeche's brother Thomas Vincent Holbeche purchased the 'Old Sun' Inn for £1,050 (the value today would be in the region of £122,000). He duly kept Charles Kemp on as licensee, who continued in this position for a total of four years until 1878.

James Pittam then had the license until 1887, followed by Thomas Smith for one year and Mrs Esther Duncalfe, late of the 'Golden Cross, Aston, for another year. During Mrs Duncalfe's stay she placed an advertisement in the Lichfield Mercury, on the 7th September 1888, which stated:-

'Old Sun' Inn

Visitors to Sutton Coldfield will meet with every attention and courtesy at the above old established house. Atkinsons Pure Malt Ales, Wines and Spirits of the finest quality. Cigars of the choicest brands. Proprietress: Mrs Duncalfe (late of the Golden Cross, Aston).

The advertisement was repeated a week later on Friday 14th September 1888 in the same paper.

In 1890 Thomas Vincent Holbeche then leased the public house to the Holt Brewery Company Limited of Holt Street, Birmingham.

It is known that auctions took place at the 'Old Sun' Inn. On Monday 27th January 1845 Aris's Birmingham Gazette included an article, which stated:-

On the 7th February 1845 W Webb was due to hold an auction selling two shops in the High Street.

Another article which appeared in the same paper said:-

On Tuesday 6th January 1856 Mr Kempson was due to sell by auction Freehold Meadow and Pasture Land at Hill Hook, Mere Green and Maney etc.

Meetings also took place at the establishment, as can be read in an article dated Monday 20th March 1854, again in Aris's Birmingham Gazette. It stated:-

Last Tuesday evening a meeting was held at the 'Old Sun' Inn under the auspices of the Sutton Park Protection Society to take into consideration the issue of the right of shooting in the Park.

Another interesting article appeared in the Birmingham Journal on Saturday 7th March 1857. It said:-

Whoever has lost a brinded Greyhound dog may, by describing the marks and paying expenses, have the dog again on application to Mr William Betts, Old Sun Inn, Sutton Coldfield.

The description 'Brinded' means having a streaky or patchy pattern, usually grey or brown in colour and used especially to describe the skin or fur of animals.

It would be interesting to know how the Licensee of the Old Sun came into the possession of the Greyhound in question. Was it just lost and found wandering the nearby streets or perhaps its owner, being slightly inebriated at the time of leaving the public house, did not notice he had left his dog behind. Or perhaps the dog, attracted by the aroma of food emanating from the hostelry decided to investigate further!

Greyhounds evolved from a form of hunting called 'coursing'. This was when the dog ran after live game, usually a rabbit or hare. The greyhound uses sight and speed rather than scent to catch its prey. Coursing was regarded as a sport by both the landed gentry and commoners and so the dogs would have been quite familiar and frequently seen at the time. For the ordinary people, of course, anything caught was always a welcome source of meat to supplement the diet.

Sporting activities were often used as pub names and the 'Greyhound', the 'Fox & Hounds', 'Dog & Duck' and 'Hare & Hounds' can still be commonly seen today. It is said that the greyhound was King Henry VIII's favourite breed of hunting dog.

An interesting photograph below taken, it is thought, around the 1870's shows a man, with his faithful greyhound by his side, standing on the dam.

There is a public house in Short Lane, Erdington that continues to bear the name the 'Greyhound', as a poignant reminder of days gone by.

The naming of pubs became common in the 12th century and, with pub names, came pub signs, as the majority of the population at the time could not read or write. In 1393, King Richard III passed an Act making it compulsory for pubs and inns to have a sign, in order to identify them to the official Ale Taster!

Between the years 1880 and 1937, just prior to the 'Old Sun' being pulled down to make way for Vesey Gardens, there were many other changes to the licensees. Clarification on these changes can be obtained by referring to the detailed 'List of Licensees' at the end of this research.

One small point of interest to conclude the story of the 'Old Sun' is that, in 1937, the year it was demolished, George Edward Stanier, the landlord of the 'Royal Oak, the other public house to meet a similar fate, was noted as being the last licensee. It may have been only for a few months, a few weeks or even a few days, but he was obviously entrusted to see out the two public houses' final hours, which must have been an extremely sad moment for him, with one era about to end and a new one about to begin.
