# AVONDALE BOYS SCHOOL

#### CLIFTON ROAD, SUTTON COLDFIELD

The following PAMPHLET relates to an Annual Sports Event being held by Avondale School, Clifton Road, Sutton Coldfield on July 27th, 1895. This would be when the Brownhill Family were running it as a private school.

During the present Covid-19 pandemic, which precludes access to the town's archives in Sutton Coldfield Library, very little about the running of the school can be discovered, although it is estimated to have been in existence for about 60 years.

However, a current resident of Manor Road, David Yates, remembers the house as being a tall, gloomy mid-Victorian building in the gothic style - three storeys with steep gables. It stood alone but was surrounded by a ring of tall pine trees,

which are still there in 2020 surrounding the path from the toucan crossing down to the Leisure Centre. He thinks the house was probably demolished in the early 1960's when much of Sutton was being "improved".

This extract from an OS Map of the site in 1913 shows the house coloured red and David believes that the additional smaller building in the grounds, with the shared drive, could very well have been the schoolroom.



The Brownhill Family came from Walsall. The 1871 Census records Rowland William Brownhill (aged 37) of Birchills Foundary, Walsall, as an Ironfounder and Brickmaker. His wife was Emily (38) and his daughters were, Linda (9), Gertrude (7), Grace (3) and Mabel (1). There was also his young son, Archibald (8 months).

In 1872, Rowland became Mayor of Walsall<sup>1</sup>. He also became famous for inventing the "Brownhill Coin in the Slot Gas Meter." Sadly, on 11 August 1895 he died and probate was granted to his widow, Emily. Why his estate was said to be worth only £40 at that time is a mystery, as newspaper reports from 1st April 1895<sup>4</sup> mention the sale of his business earlier that year raised £50,000.

The 1901 Census shows that members of the family had set up a private boys' school at Avondale. Archibald (now 30) was a schoolmaster, his mother Emily (68) was said to be housekeeper, although by the 1911 Census she had become proprietor of the school, with Archibald, Grace and another son, Horace, as schoolmasters. By 1939, Emily had died and Horace had become the owner.

Archibald died in 1949, Horace in 1956 and Grace in 1958. It is supposed that the school would have closed shortly afterwards.
