# The Dixie Estate, Sutton Coldfield Box 29, Bundle B

B22 contains letters and papers 1590-1653 (checked Aug.1999). B1 is the College's title deed to the estate.

### 16<sup>th</sup> November 1594 B1

Bargain and sale, Nicholas Fuller of London, esq. and Rowland Odell of London, merchant, to the College, of property conveyed to them by Simon Parratt. Consideration £500 [for typed copy see B29]

### 27<sup>th</sup> September 1596 B2

Letter of attorney appointing Richard Lister, M.A., Fellow of the College to receive the annual rent of £30 from Simon Parrott and to enter on the property in case of non-payment. Endorsed, note that Lister entered Steresfeyld for non-payment of rent due at Mich. 1596, 29<sup>th</sup> November 1596 in the presence of Francis Gough and John Bedell.

# 13<sup>th</sup> November 1596 B3<sup>1</sup>

Letter of attorney appointing Anthony Harrison of Barnards Inn Middlesex, gent., for the same purposes. Endorsed, memorandum that Harrison read the letter aloud and demanded the £15 rent on 23, 24 and 25 November at the telling house on the West part of the Royal Exchange, but no rent was paid. Signed by Harrison and three witnesses between 4 and 5pm. On the 25<sup>th</sup>.

#### Undated B3<sup>2</sup>

Note of bonds: Perrott and Richard Simonds to Nicholas Smyth of Westminster gents, in £200, 9<sup>th</sup> March 1592; another similar bond.

### 19<sup>th</sup> August 1598 B4 and related papers: B22

Letters patent, exemplification of Chancery decree on behalf of the college against Simon Weston, Thomas Keene, and Ann Perrott (now married to Marmaduke Dawney) concerning a statute staple of Simon Perrott by virtue of which money had been claimed from the College's lands in Sutton Coldfield, even though it had already been discharged: the College's property to be freed from it.

### 28th October 1598 B5

Release and quitclaim, Thomas Gybons of Sutton Coldfield esq; to the College, of an annual rent of 6d arising out of the White Hart in Sutton.

# 26<sup>th</sup> March 1601 B 6<sup>1</sup>

Agreement, Nicholas Smythe of Westminster and William Gardyner of Langham, Surrey, esquires; executors of William Gardyner of Bermondsey esq, and the College, concerning, a statute staple dated 25th June 1590 by which Simon Perrott was bound to the late William Gardyner in £600, now in the hands of the executors, and a lease of some of the lands made by the College to Marmaduke Dawney at the request of Smythe and Gardyner, (see B 25-6 ) dated 26<sup>th</sup> March 1601: if any attempt is made to put the statute staple in force they will assign it to the College. The College agrees to indemnify the land let to Dawney against all claims except the statute.

#### 26<sup>th</sup> March 1601 B 6<sup>2</sup>

Smythe and Gardyner's bond to keep the agreement.

#### **October 1604 B7 (virtually illegible)**

"College letter of attorney to William Bridge, to enter upon Marmaduke Downey's lease". Endorsed, note that he entered upon and took possession of the property by taking possession of Maney House, 6<sup>th</sup> October 1604. [found in a box of miscellaneous documents, 1990. For Bridge cf. col.9.10, no 49 - the same man?]

# 18<sup>th</sup> January 1605 B 8 [B9]

Copy of the Lord Chancellor's decree empowering Sir Wolstan Dixie and not the Company of Skinners to nominate a schoolmaster "of the said Colledge" and fellows and scholars in the University of Cambridge.

#### 1<sup>st</sup> December 1607 B9 [B10]

Covenant and agreement between the College and Sir Wolstan Dixie concerning the Dixie fellows and Scholars. [Endorsed, note of production of deed in a court case 1696.]

### 1<sup>st</sup> July 1621 B10 [B8]

College's letter of attorney appointing Thomas Reddit of Cambridge, yeoman, to take into the College's possession all the lands leased to Marmaduke Downey and to order them to the best profit he can until Lady Day 1622, under the special direction of Chadderton.

#### 5th October 1624 B11<sup>1.2</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> November 1625 [B12]

Acquittances from the Warden and Society of Sutton Coldfield for 19s 4d yearly chief rent due from the College lands.

# 7<sup>th</sup> January 1639/40 Bosworth B12 [B11]

Letter from Sir Wolstan Dixie to the College asking them to increase the amount paid to the Dixie Fellows and Scholars now that the value of the lands has increased, according to the covenants made in 1607. [B9]

# 16<sup>th</sup> November 1594 B13<sup>2</sup>

Tenure of lands in Sutton Coldfield at the time when the College bought them. [No valuation]

#### August 1592 B 13<sup>1</sup>

Survey of the lands purchased by Fuller from Parrott and demised to Parrott. Later note that the acreage does not agree with the measurement made by the College. [For terrier and notes, 1592, see B22 (ii)]

### 26<sup>th</sup> June 1598 B13<sup>3</sup>

Rental of property in Maney and Wylde.

### 27<sup>th</sup> September 1598 B13<sup>4</sup>

Survey of the lands and tenements in Sutton Coldfield.

#### 1619 B13<sup>5</sup>

Survey of lands in Sutton Coldfield and Maney, taken by Sir Wolstan Dixie.

#### Undated B13<sup>6</sup>

List of rentals and leases up to B19.

#### 28<sup>th</sup> November 1678 B14

Sir Wolstan Dixie's bill in Chancery against the College for augmenting the Dixie Fellowships.

[B15, the College's answer to the bill was found to be missing in 1975.]

# 8<sup>th</sup> October 1670 B16<sup>1-2</sup>

Lease and counterpart, the College to John Rastall of Sutton Coldfield, gent., for 21 years from Mich. 1670. Annual rent £29.

[Original B16<sup>2</sup> lease to James Heath for 21 years from Lady Day 1689 - found to be missing in1975.]

### 6<sup>th</sup> July 1699 B 17<sup>1-2</sup>

Lease and counterpart to Charles Chadwick of Sutton Coldfield esq. of a lately built stone messuage called the White Hart and [other specified lands and tenements] for 21 years from Lady Day1699. Annual rent £26, payable half-yearly, and two fat capons or 5s at each audit. [Original lease purchased by college in 1938.]

### 6<sup>th</sup> July 1699 B 17<sup>3</sup>

Chadwick's bond to keep covenants.

# 5<sup>th</sup> June 1742 B18 [B19]

Survey of the College's lands in Sutton Coldfield measured by William Tranter, with receipt for his charge of  $\pounds 2$ . 7s. 8d.

# 10<sup>th</sup> May 1743 B19<sup>1</sup> [B18]

Counterpart lease to John Gibbons of Sutton Coldfield, gent, for 21 years from Lady Day 1743. Annual rent £70, payable half-yearly.

# 10<sup>th</sup> May 1743 B19<sup>2</sup>

Gibbons bond to keep covenants. [Formerly BUR.0.7]

# 25<sup>th</sup> January 1764 B20

Counterpart lease to John Kendrick of Sutton Coldfield, yeoman, for 21 years from 5<sup>th</sup> April 1764. Annual rent £70, payable half-yearly. Agreement for demolition and rebuilding of the Bulls Head Inn. [For bond see B25/13]

#### 7<sup>th</sup> March 1701 [volume] B21

Copy of Lord Keeper Wright's decree concerning the Dixie Foundation; copies of form agreed upon for the nomination of the Dixie scholars and fellows, 13<sup>th</sup> November 1700, signed and sealed by Dixie; receipts of rent and disbursements 1701-1735.

#### 1825-1827 B23

Abstract of Mr Bedford's title to land at Maney; letters and papers concerning inclosure, collection of rents etc. [List with bundle.]

Legal papers relating to Chancery case between the Dixie family and the College. [List in box. See also B26, B28.]

# Dixie Estate, Sutton Coldfield: Land at Little Sutton, Box 29, Bundle Bb

# **Undated Bb1**

Abstract of title of Thomas Rochford to 7/8 parts of two pieces of land at Little Sutton, known as Turners or Coopers croft and the lesser or little Jackamoore [deeds abstracted dated 1655-1790].

# 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> September 1800 Bb2<sup>1-2</sup>

Lease and release (1) Thomas Rochford of Hill, Sutton Coldfield, yeoman, nephew and heir of the late John Rochford of Little Sutton, yeoman, and Sarah his wife; (2) Thomas Chattock of Hay House, Aston, gent; (3) John Hacket of Moor Hall, Sutton Coldfield, esq; (4) William Marler of Hill, wheelwright, and John Curzon of Hill, yeoman, his trustee; (5) Charles Nevill of Sutton Coldfield Saddler. (Conveyance by Rochford and his mortgagees to Marler and his trustee.) Property: 7/8 parts of Turners, otherwise Coopers Croft, containing 3a [boundaries] and the Lesser or Little Jackamoore containing 1-1/2a [boundaries], both in Little Sutton quarter in Sutton Coldfield. Consideration £167.

# 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> April 1831 Bb3<sup>1-2</sup>

Mortgage (lease and release), William Marler of Little Sutton, wheelwright, to William Smith of the New House, Sutton Coldfield, gent; of property as in Bb2, also 2 messuages, one formerly a shop in Little Sutton, known as the Stone House, and the allotment set out in respect of the property under the inclosure, to secure £350.

### 9th September 1843 Bb4

Transfer of mortgage, (1) John Smith of the Inner Temple, London, barrister; [ son of William]. (2) Elizabeth Marler of Little Sutton, widow [of William] William Marler of same, farmer [ son of William] and Thomas Sedgwick of Wood End, Shenstone, Staffs, timber valuer [executor of William Marler]; (3) Thomas Hay wood of Sutton Coldfield, timber merchant, to secure £350. Property as to Bb3, except for little Jackamoore, which was included in the Mortgage by mistake, having been conveyed to Francis Beynon Hacket in 1814.

#### 7<sup>th</sup> May 1849 Bb5

Conveyance, (1) Honoria Haywood of Sutton Coldfield, widow, Thomas, and William Haywood of same, timber merchants; (2) William Marler of Little Sutton, farmer, and Thomas Sedgwick; (3) Charles Loveridge of Birmingham, gent; (4) Thomas Hackett of Sutton Coldfield, yeoman. (Conveyance by trustees for sale under William Marler's will to Charles Loveridge and his trustee.) Consideration: £350 to the mortgagees and £83 to the trustees for sale. Property: 3 acres 2 roods 35 perches called Turners or Coopers Croft [boundaries].

#### 1849 Bb 6

Abstract of title of the devisees in trust for sale under the will of Mr. William Marler deceased to a piece of freehold land called Coopers Croft situated in Little Sutton. [Marked "for Mr. Charles Loveridge, purchaser of lot 3"]

[Note that Bb7, conveyance by Francis B. Hacket to Charles Loveridge, 12 November 1852, and Bb8, exchange, Loveridge with Emmanuel College, 28 February 1866, were sent to Eddowes, Perry and Osbourne on 5 August 1955. B9 and B10 were also sent but subsequently returned.]

### 5<sup>th</sup> January 1866 Bb9

Consent of the Copyhold Commissioners to the exchange. [with full details of land involved.]

### 16<sup>th</sup> April 1866 Bb10

Letter from the Commissioners giving details of investment of  $\pounds 200$  consideration money paid to the College as part of the exchange.

# Dixie Estate, Sutton Coldfield Box 29, Bundle A

### 18th December 1531 A1

Grant, Thomas Hurst, Warden of Sutton Coldfield, and the fellowship of the same to William Alen of the same, of 20 strips of land in a pasture called Beremors, with William's land on either side, also a piece of land in Hallfilde and other pieces called Whilweys and Hudslough. Annual rent 9s 6d, payable half- yearly, fine 2s. Given at the common house called le Motehall.

### 10<sup>th</sup> October 1547 (8<sup>th</sup> April 1545) A2

Probate of will of William Alen, gent; bequeathing all his lands and tenements to his wife Anne for life and then to Robert Harecourt, gent; on trust to make various payments [details]. To Antony and Walter Harecourt, and to Antony and Walter if Robert dies childless.

#### 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1577 A3

Lease, Walter Harcourt of Tamworth, Staffordshire; gent; and Edward his son, to Robert Fytche junior, Vyvyan and Richard Fytche, three of the sons of R.F. senior of Allesley, Warwickshire, gent; a mansion house or messuage in Maney in Sutton Coldfield, now occupied by Walter Harcourt, various crofts and closes[specified] in Maney and Wylde in Sutton Coldfield, a cottage with a backside in Maney occupied by Thurstones Lowe, carpenter, and all their other messuages and lands in Sutton Coldfield, reserving one messuage and two cottages [occupiers] and one piece of meadow called Edowe croft occupied by Walter, and a gift of all growing corn and grain: no rent until Mich. next, then for 40 years, rent free for 12 years, because £240 has been paid as a fine, and then £20 a year payable half-yearly.

#### 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1577 A4<sup>1</sup>

Statute merchant between the same parties.

# 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1577 A4<sup>2</sup>

Indenture between the same parties making void a statute merchant by which the Harecourtes are bound to pay £500 to Robert Fytche, provided that they keep all the covenants in their lease [A3].

#### Michaelmas Term 1577 A5

Fine between John Potter, George Gardener and Anthony Bowyer, and Walter and Edward Harecourte and Dorothy wife of Edward, concerning a messuage, a cottage, two gardens, one orchard, 60a land, 30a meadow, 300a pasture, 60a wood and 1000a furze and heath in Sutton Coldfield.

#### 1936 B29 [B28]

Copy abstract of the College's title to lands at Maney. [Abstract consists of a typed copy of B1.]

# Sutton Coldfield – the White Hart and a house etc. in Maney or the Wylde. Box 29, B25

27<sup>th</sup> February 1622/3, B25/1

Lease, the College to Edward Willoughbie of Sutton Coldfield, esq; of the White Hart Inn, a house now being built adjacent to it, and various pieces of land (described), in consideration in his having rebuilt the White Hart in stone at his own expense (dimensions of building and details of rooms given), the previous timber inn having been burnt down, and also having built 2 other houses ... [next lines illegible], all in Sutton Coldfield, for 40 years, rent £11 a year. [Parchment badly rubbed, stained green in places].

#### B25/1A,B

Willoughbie's bond to keep covenants [badly damaged]. Another copy in good condition [BUR.0.7]

# 28<sup>th</sup> October 1659 B25/2

Lease, the College to Robert Pargiter of Greatworth, Northants, gent., of the White Hart inn and various messuages and lands (described), for 21 years at a yearly rent of £11. [Damaged possibly eaten on folds]

#### 28<sup>th</sup> October 1659 B25/2A

Pargiter's bond to keep covenants[formerly BUR .0.7.]

# 9th January 1676 B25/3

Assignment of remainder of term, John Cooper late of Sutton Coldfield, gent., to Lucy Frost of same, widow: recites that Phyllis Pargiter of Battersea, Surrey, widow of Robert, being entitled to the remainder of his lease of the White Hart [B25/2], assigned the remainder of the term to John Cooper on 22 November 1670.

### 28<sup>th</sup> November 1677 B25/4, B25/5

Lease and counterpart, the College to Lucy Frost of Sutton Coldfield, widow of the White Hart and other messuages and lands (described) for 21 years, at a yearly rent of £11 for the first 3 years and £14 for the rest of the term. [B25/4 is badly worn on some of the folds.]

#### 26<sup>th</sup> March 1601 B25/6

Lease, the College to Marmaduke Dawney of Sutton Coldfield, esq., of a mansion house in Maney or the Wylde, 3 cottages (tenants named) - these appear in later leases - and various pieces of land and meadow (described) for 21 years at a yearly rent of £33. [B6 refers.]

# 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1647 B25/7

Lease, the College to Rowland Thornton of Coleshill, Warwickshire, yeoman, of a mansion house [as in B25/6] for 21 years at a yearly rent of £29.

# 3<sup>rd</sup> December 1647 B25/8

Bond, Rowland Thornton to the College in  $\pounds 50$ , to keep the covenants in the lease.

#### 1<sup>st</sup> November 1652 B25/9

Lease, the College to Rowland Thornton late of Coleshill, of the same property for 21 years at a yearly rent of  $\pounds 29$ .

#### 30<sup>th</sup> March 1654 B25/10

Bond, John Rastell of Sutton Coldfield, yeoman to the College in  $\pm 100$  to observe the covenants in Rowland Thornton's lease.

# 9<sup>th</sup> August 1689 B25/11

Lease, the College to Thomas Freeman of Sutton Coldfield, yeoman of the same property for 21 years at a yearly rent of  $\pounds 29$ .

#### 26<sup>th</sup> March 1710 B25/12

Lease, the College to John Davis of Market Bosworth, Leicestershire, gent; of the same property for 21 years at a rent of a peppercorn for the first year, £10 for the second year and £30 as part of a fine of £60, and £40 a year for the remainder of the term.

#### 26<sup>th</sup> March 1710 B25/12A

Davis bond to keep covenants [formerly BUR.0.7.]

# 25<sup>th</sup> January 1764 B25/13

Bond of John Kendrick of Sutton Coldfield, yeoman, in £500 to the College, to keep the covenants in a lease of the same date [property not specified.] [For lease see B20]

#### 1694-1710 B26

Correspondence and papers relating to the Chancery case between the Dixie family and the College. [List in box with B22. See also B24, B28.]

#### 1854, 1855, 1860. B27

Three Counsel's opinions on questions concerning Dixie advowsons.

#### 10<sup>th</sup> January 1695 B28

Information from the Attorney General to the Lord Keeper concerning the Dixie case. [See also B24, B26. Found loose and added to box]

# Dixie Estate, Sutton Coldfield: property in Tamworth Lane Box 29, Bundle Cc

10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> May 1831. Cc1-2

Lease and release, James Edward Homer of Wraxall Somerset, esq., son and heir of Edward Homer, late of Birmingham, merchant, afterwards of West Town, Barkeswell, Somerset, esq., deceased, who was the brother and heir of William Homer, late of Sutton Coldfield, gent., to William Wilkins of Sutton Coldfield, tallow chandler, of 2 closes of land beside the turnpike road from Sutton Coldfield to Tamworth called Tamworth Lane, called the Whitehouse Close and Tamworth Lane Meadow, formerly 3 closes, containing 5A [boundaries given], and the allotment to be made in respect of the land under the inclosure. Consideration £600.

# 12th May 1831 Cc2

Mortgage, Wilkins to Edward Kendrick of Weeford, Staffordshire, yeoman, to secure £500. Enclosed, note of repayment of £200, 28<sup>th</sup> December 1846.

# 24<sup>th</sup> December 1869 Cc3

Assignment of mortgage, Wilkins, and the representatives of Kendrick to Richard Fowler of Erdington, Aston, land agent, and Richard Potter of Coleshill, farmer, to secure £300.

#### 13th July 1871 Cc4

Conveyance, (1) Benjamin Dain, late of Birmingham, now of Slade House, Gravelly Hill, Aston, gent., (2) Fowler and Potter [as in Cc3]; (3) Howard Samuel Smith of Birmingham, public accountant; (4) John Samuel Jerome of Holland House, Sutton Coldfield, gent. (Conveyance by Mortgagees and their representatives following bankruptcy of Wilkins to Jerome, purchaser at auction.) Property: 5 Acres 2 Roods 28 Perches. Land [boundaries given] with a cottage occupied by John Warton.

#### 1873 Cc5

Abstract of title of John Samuel Jerome.

#### 8<sup>th</sup> December 1873 Cc6

Memorandum of terms of tenancy, the College, and John Clent Boucher. (Yearly tenancy, rent £30 per annum. [Note that Cc7, exchange between Mrs M.E. Jerome, S. Cook and J. Reynolds, and the College, 17<sup>th</sup> November 1874, and Cc8 the consent of the copyhold commissioners, were sent to Eddowes in January 1908.]

# 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1902 Cc9

Duplicate agreement for easement for a sewer through the land in Tamworth Lane, the College, and the Corporation of Sutton Coldfield, with plan.

# Dixie Estate, Sutton Coldfield Blake's Pieces Box 29 Bundle Dd

### 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> January1839 Dd 1-2

(Lease and Release.) Conveyance, William Fosbury, late of Edgbaston, now of Everton near Liverpool, esq. and others, to George Bodington of Sutton Coldfield, surgeon, of three fourth parts of two closes of land at Maney, called Blakes Piece and Far Blakes Piece, [occupiers and previous names given] containing 10 Acres 3 Roods and 1 Perches. With plan (on back of second sheet of release).

# 25th January1839 Dd 3

Acknowledgment of deeds by Mrs. Susannah Power Robinson, wife of Thomas Baker Robinson of Birmingham (parties to D1-2).

### 29th March 1851 Dd 4

Conveyance, devisees under the will of Mary Wood deceased, and others, to George Bodington, of one fourth part of the same lands. Attached, undertaking by William Turner on behalf of devisees to produce deeds relating to John Wood's life estate in the land and to provide copies, at Bodington's expense.

# 29<sup>th</sup> March 1851 Dd 5

Acknowledgment of deeds by Hannah, wife of William Turner.

#### 31st December 1862 Dd 6

Conveyance, George Bodington to John de Heley Chadwick of New Hall Sutton Coldfield, esq., of land as in Dd 1, now found to contain 10 Acres, 3 Roods and 5 Perches [boundaries given]. Consideration £1400.

# 19<sup>th</sup> January 1863 Dd 7

Mortgage, Chadwick to Thomas Henry Cope of Cannock Staffordshire, draper, to secure £900.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> May 1868 Dd 8

Exchange between Chadwick and Emmanuel College: Blakes Pieces for 3 closes of land fronting on Coles Lane, Maney [acreages and details given]. Mortgage paid off and £415.11s paid to the College.

# 6<sup>th</sup> November 1866 Dd 9

Consent of the copyhold Commissioners to the exchange.

#### 9th March 1868 Dd 10

Bank of England receipt for £415.11s.

# 26<sup>th</sup> October 1868 Dd 11

Lease to James Reynolds of the Coldfield, Sutton Coldfield, farmer, on a yearly lease. Annual rent £28, payable quarterly, and 2s a year to the Bursar.

# Dixie Estate, Sutton Coldfield Blake's Pieces Box 29 Bundle Dd

# 25<sup>th</sup> April 1870 Dd12

Assignment of lease, Reynolds of the School Farm, Sutton Coldfield, to Edwin Jenkins of Wylde Green, Farmer.

# 19th December 1923 Dd 13

Lease to Emanual Bill of 90 Holland Road, Sutton Coldfield, John Bill of 92 Holland Road, and Randolph Boycott of Coleshill Road, of two pieces of land between Maney Hill Road and Coles Lane containing 17.062 Acres, for 5 years from 25<sup>th</sup> of March 1923.Annual rent £43.10s, payable quarterly. To be used as allotments. With plan.

The remainder of this bundle, Dd 14-23, consisted of building leases and confirmation deeds dated 1936-1937. They were all sent to Eddowes Perry and Osbourne, Solicitors, at Sutton Coldfield, in August 1968, in connection with the College's purchase of the head lease. A copy of the list prepared at that date is in the box, and the leases are listed in the old catalogue.

# Sutton Coldfield, Muffins Den, Nicklins Field, Little Sutton. Box 29, Bundle Ee

### **16<sup>th</sup> September 1872 Ee 1(1)**
